Empowering Students with an Entrepreneurial Mindset

Entrepreneurial methods is a major focus of Webb School's strategic plan and is the catalyst for the creation of its Entrepreneurship Program, which empowers Upper School students with an entrepreneurial mindset that can serve them no matter what career path they choose – providing real-world learning for long-term success.

The program is a multi-pronged journey that begins with an introduction to entrepreneurship and design thinking. Students work with and learn from entrepreneurs/business leaders and collaborate with peers and business owners while

applying innovative thinking and imagination to solve real-world problems. The subsequent Honors-level *Entrepreneurship: Theory and Practice* course uses Harvard Business School case studies to focus on the concepts of entrepreneurship and the practical tools and technologies that propel them. Alternating between case-based discussion of an entrepreneurial activity and an examination of the principles suggested in the Harvard studies, this course is a rigorous exploration through the topics that equip entrepreneurs to make decisions and act upon ideas. Students who complete the

Entrepreneurship: Theory and Practice course can enroll in the Honors-level "Capstone Experience" their senior year, which charges individuals or teams to craft a business plan for a for-profit or social enterprise and culminates with a pitch presentation to Spartan alumni and parents and venture partners.

Throughout the sequential program, a premium is placed on creating compelling interactions with local alumni and parents who have their own entrepreneurial stories and expertise to share, and enhancing existing and developing new partnerships with entrepreneurial enterprises in the area.


IMPACT OF COVID-19: Following local and state health recommendations, Webb School of Knoxville made the difficult decision to close campus on March 23, 2020, and move to a virtual method of learning. Prior to closing, we trained students in the tools they needed to successfully migrate to an online learning environment; out of necessity and a sense of urgency, the Class of 2022 has developed facility and familiarity with technology, including Google Classroom, Zoom, and a variety of other learning management platforms. Classes were conducted face-to-face via live learning classrooms, a trend that continued throughout this year based on need and choice. For fall 2020, Webb made the decision to reopen its campus in a traditional, in-person format. This was truly a team effort that required cooperation, patience, and flexibility from every member of our community. As COVID-19 cases occurred around the Knoxville area, students were asked to pivot in response to public health needs. At various points, Webb implemented an A/B day schedule, suspended on-campus classes, and contact-traced students for quarantine when exposed to positive cases. Students reaffirmed their commitment to our Honor Code and demonstrated that honor was not confined to a traditional school day or a campus, but rather was essential to uphold in their everyday personal lives. Throughout the pandemic experience, our students have proven that they are adaptable, disciplined, and truly capable of creating a culture of interacting with others in a respectful and productive manner. While many were disappointed that traditional activities like clubs and organizations, sports participation, and even events such as dances were disrupted, Webb students demonstrated resilience and commitment to the greater good during a very challenging time. Over the past year, we proudly observed our students' development, preparedness, and eagerness to serve as leaders of character in anticipation of joining your campus community, and beyond, in an ever-changing world.






Standardized Tests for the Class of 2021





In 2021, 219 Webb Upper School students sat for 514 AP exams. Seventy-four percent of Webb's AP students received scores of 3 or higher; 55 students earned a score of 5 and 95 posted a score of 4. Over the past five years, an average of 84 percent of Webb

School's AP students have scored 3 or higher.

bringing arts education to life

Since 2002, Webb's Artist-In-Residence program has introduced students to professional artists from across the United States and beyond. Supported by proceeds from the school's annual ArtXtravaganza art show and sale, this four-to-six week oncampus teaching and learning experience each fall and spring provides Webb students with a glimpse into the real world of art by exposing them to professional artists, their work, and their perspectives, and inspires students to explore their own creative abilities.

Seventeen Webb graduates from the Class of 2021, representing 11 sports, are continuing their athletic careers in college. Five Spartan alumni are current or former professional athletes. In 2020-2021, nearly 80 percent of Webb Middle and Upper School students participated in Spartan athletics across 60-plus teams in 27 different sports.



💁 real-world research

Webb's Research Fellows program provides motivated and qualified students a tailored opportunity to take their scholarship to the next level by conducting university-caliber research in the sciences or humanities and partnering with mentors to facilitate their work. After successfully completing the Research Methods course, which introduces research writing, methodology, and communication, and guides juniors and seniors through the process of developing their own research proposals, students can submit their work to be considered for the Research Fellows program. Research Scholars complete the program with the submission of their original research in the form of a scholarly manuscript, a poster display, and an oral presentation to share with the greater Webb community. Recent projects have included: an analysis of gender-based memory bias; the impact of Malcolm X during the civil rights movement and in contemporary society; physical activity and tobacco use in high school students; an evaluation of the methods and philosophies of Martin Luther King Jr. and Henry David Thoreau; and the effect of highfrequency trading on stock market volatility.
